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#### Summary

### Key Findings and Analysis

Survey respondents indicated that the most pressing housing need for Kasaan tribal households is more access to homeownership (100%). This is followed by more affordable housing, which 91% of survey respondents say has a high level of demand.

A follow-up open-ended question asking Kasaan tribal households for the most important tribal priority garnered similar feedback, with more opportunities for tribal residents to build their own homes, and more access to home ownership overall representing the top responses. When asked which THRHA housing program was of most interest to respondents, the most common answer was "Access to funding to help renovate my home," with 7 households expressing interest in program participation.

Nearly half (45%) of households surveyed live in single-family homes, and 36% are in multi-family housing units. Another 9% live in mobile homes, and 9% have other arrangements.

Seventy percent of survey respondents own their homes in Kasaan. Another 30% rent their homes. Fifty-five percent of survey respondents report that a member of their household would prefer to own a home but does not. The average household size is 3

people, and half of the surveyed households have children living in them. Seventeen percent of the households surveyed include a single parent, and 17% have a member over 60 years of age.

Just over a quarter (27%) of all households surveyed reported opening their home to an individual experiencing homelessness over the past year.

Homes are generally reported to be in good condition, but 10% of respondents said the condition of their homes was poor. Wood stoves are the primary way Kasaan tribal homes are heated (55% of homes), followed by heat pumps (27%).

The average annual household income is \$55,500. Sixty percent of respondents are cost-burdened, which is defined as spending 30% or greater of household income toward housing costs. No respondents are severely cost-burdened. Kasaan respondents have an average monthly mortgage or rent of \$939. On average, households say they can afford \$810 per month on rent or mortgage.

Sixty-two percent of the households are low income, according to federal Housing and Urban Development (HUD) criteria, down from 89% in 2019.








#### THRHA Households Top Priorities

### How important are the following tribal housing needs? (Top answers)



Respondents were asked to rate 14 housing options by level of demand. "More access to home ownership" was rated as the having the highest level of demand or need in Kasaan (100%), followed by the need for more affordable housing (91%).

### What is the most important tribal priority for housing improvements? (Open-Ended)



In a follow up question, tribal household respondents were then asked to write down their highest housing priority. Half mentioned the desire of local tribal members to build their own homes. Thirty percent said there need to be more housing available for purchase and more pathways to homeownership.

### Survey Methodology

The Tlingit Haida Regional Housing Authority (THRHA) contracted with SALT to conduct a tribal housing needs assessment in the 12 Southeast communities that they serve. The housing assessment provides a data-based evaluation of community needs and goals. The survey asked tribal households to respond to 33 questions about their homes, housing preferences, household costs, and finances. This information will be used in the development of Central Council of Tlingit and Haida Tribes of Alaska's three-year housing plan for Kasaan.

Rain Coast Data designed the survey instrument on behalf of SALT with input from THRHA. The survey was administered electronically from late January through late February 2024. Paper copies were also made available to survey participants.

A total of 11 tribal households in Kasaan responded to the survey. Responses received comprise an estimated 100% of all estimate Alaska Native households in Kasaan, but this tribal household count has not been independently verified. Due to this high response rate, the survey findings have a 100% confidence level with a 0% confidence interval. However, even the existence of one additional tribal household in Kasaan that was not surveyed would increase the confidence level to 95% with a confidence interval of 9%.

THRHA is the tribally designated housing entity for 12 tribes in Southeast Alaska, including the Central Council of Tlingit and Haida Tribes of Alaska. THRHA's mission is to connect Southeast Alaskans with sustainable housing opportunities and innovative financial solutions.



#### What year was your house built?


Respondents' homes are an average of 27 year years old. When this study was last conducted five years ago in 2019, the average age of the housing stock was 28 years.

Kasaan has the newest housing stock in the THRHA 12-community region, while Skagway has the oldest homes.


#### Average Age of Housing Stock


#### Average home age by community



### Rate the overall condition of your home




Most (64%) of Kasaan tribal households said their homes were in good shape. Twenty-seven percent indicated that their living conditions were adequate, while 9% said the condition of their home was poor.

## What do you use primarily to heat your home?



Just over half of Kasaan tribal respondents heat their home using wood stoves, while nine percent use electric heat, and 27% use a heat pump— representing a significant shift from 2019 when no households reported using a heat pump. The average reported winter heating cost was \$291 per month.

The average value of a housing unit owned by a respondent in Kasaan is \$165,000 — representing a 90% increase from when this survey was fielded 5 years previously.

The average value of a housing unit owned by a a respondent in the 12-community THRHA region is \$290,120 — representing a 56% increase.

Across all Southeast Alaska homes, the median home value is \$387,000, a 30% 5-year increase, according to the American Community Survey.

## What is your current mortgage or rent (excluding utilities)?



The average monthly or mortgage rent paid by Kasaan tribal householders is \$939. These figures do not include utilities. Households were asked how much rent or mortgage they could reasonably afford, regardless of what they are paying. On average they could afford \$810.

Half of Kasaan tribal households own their own homes, but no longer have a mortgage.

Across all Southeast Alaska households (tribal and non-tribal) the average rent is \$1,271, a 15% 5-year increase.

## What is your approximate annual household income?

#### **Average Household Income**



The average income of tribal households (of those reporting an income above \$0) in Kasaan is \$55,500, a 42% increase over five years earlier.

Skagway tribal households report the highest average household income in the THRHA region, while Kake households earn the least. Wrangell was the only community to see household income decline over the past five years.

Across all Southeast Alaska homes, the median household income is \$91,700, a 22% five-year increase.





## Do you spend more than 30% of your household income towards housing costs?



Thirty percent of Kasaan tribal households live in a home that they rent. Another 70% own their homes. This includes 50% of respondents who own their home and no longer pay a mortgage.








### Is your home overcrowded?




## How many children under age 18 live in your household?


#### **Household Members Include**



Seventeen percent of Kasaan tribal households contain a person over the age of 60; representing a decrease from 2019 when 30% of Kasaan tribal households had a person aged 60 or older. Half (50%) of all Kasaan tribal households include children, up from 44% five years earlier. Seventeen percent of all homes contain a single parent, up from 10%.

The number of households containing a person with a disability also increased from 10% to 17% over the past five years; while the number of households with a veteran remained zero. No tribal homes contain both grandparents and grandchildren.


## Percentage of Tribal Households in THRHA Region with a 60+ Year Old




Kasaan has the lowest percentage of households with a member over 60, followed by Petersburg. Angoon has the highest percentage of households containing older residents. More than half (53%) of Angoon households have a person over 60, followed by Saxman (40%).

### What year did you (or first household member) move into your current home?









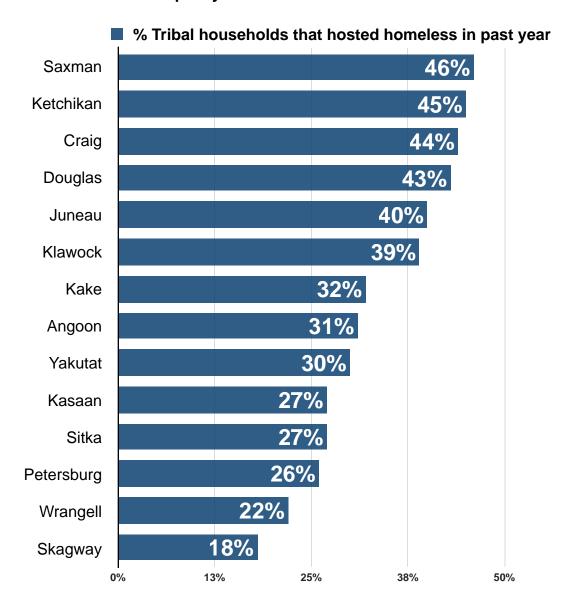



Have you opened your home overnight to a person or persons experiencing homelessness in the past year?







#### Analysis of open ended responses to top priority





More than half of Kasaan tribal households responding (55%) noted that they have member who would prefer to own their own home but do not. The top barrier to this was the expense of owing a separate home, noted by 57% of respondents, representing a 17% increase over the last time this question was asked in 2019. The next top answer was a general lack of availability (57%).

While 70% of respondents in this survey currently own their own home, 100% of all respondents said they would prefer to own their own home rather than rent.

#### All responses to this open-ended questions are presented below:

- More affordable, the housing in the area is described as low income, then turns around and takes 1/3 of what you make, that seems exorbitant. And you can't really get ahead, if you start to make more money, you're expected to report that so that your rent can be "readjusted."
- Finding land for tribal members to build homes on.
- Help our tribal members build a home on their land or update the current homes.
   Tribal members need to own their homes, not rentals.
- Helping tribals members who have land and no house, build houses. Renovate unsafe housing and increase energy efficiency.

- More available for purchase
- More homes for our tribal members to own or get built.
- More Housing in all areas listed above.
- More large family rentals, increase in home repair opportunities and more Rent to Own opportunities would help with Kasaans' returning families with ancestral roots, as well as new coming residents.
- More opportunity for property owners to build.
- No more rentals. Need small affordable homes that can be owned by tribal members in the community. They shouldn't be able to sell them to nontribal persons or entities.

#### Provide any feedback you might have for Tlingit Haida Regional Housing Authority, such as things they do well, or recommendations for improvement

Respondents were asked to provide feedback to THRHA. All responses to this open-ended questions are presented below:

- Lower the base rent income percentage to actually be reasonable.
- Having intake employees delegated to small communities would be helpful. The empty units here are needed, yet used for workers to come stay in. More communication and follow through. Getting rid of black mold in the T&H units.
- I don't like that rental houses that are built by T&H actually take revenue away from the community instead of allowing the local tribe to benefit from the housing. T&H took the land and don't compensate back to the tribe who owned the land at all!
- I prefer not to have Tlingit & Haida controlling too much of our housing in Kasaan. People who want should own their own land and be able to build their own homes using the native loan programs (without paying for contractors). T&H housing sometimes brings in folks from outside the community, displacing people who are from here. At least OVK should have some say in tenants, if anything. That's not ideal but would help.
- Improve monitoring of tribal housing. Maintenance needs to spend more time onsite, there are lots of lease violations going on and NOBODY seems to be paying attention. There is drugs and garbage everywhere. Allow each community to have a say in who gets in. And incentivize renters that work, don't make them pay more. Or if you do, out that one's into a savings account for the renter to buy a house
- More home inspections and to make sure tenants keep housing area clean and presentable.
- Need more programs where they build homes on tribal members lands for them or help them buy a home.
- People need small affordable homes that are built mostly of local materials in a way that they can do their own maintenance or expansion.
- They're doing a good job so far, but better is better.
